Our 2022-2023 fiscal year was a year of change in Literacy Services of IRC's leadership. Both our Influence in the community and our financial and organizational Capacity continue to strengthen. To that end, following the establishment of our endowment with the Indian River Community Foundation in June 2022, we have developed new planned giving initiatives and materials to grow our endowment in order to secure Literacy Services' future. 

2022-2023 Fiscal Year Operating Overview*


Literacy Services of IRC (LSIRC) received income of \$286,992 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023. This amount includes \$222,912 in contributions and grants, \$47,520 from special events and \$16,560 from investment income and in-kind donations. Expenses totaled \$264,033 of which 64.3% was spent on direct program services such as staff salaries, training our volunteer tutors and essential educational supplies; 21.3% was spent on organizational management; and 14.4% was spent on fundraising. Literacy Services of IRC had net assets of \$468,693 on June 30, 2023.

Thanks to LSIRC's 158 volunteer tutors, we served 284 students with 9,598 instructional hours.

I am honored and overjoyed to be serving as the new Executive Director of Literacy Services of Indian River County.





Did You Know?

- In Indian River County, the numbers of adults who struggle to read and write in English are startling: 36% of adults are low-literate and 19% of adults are very low-literate.[1] This means that more than 1 in 2 adults in our community struggle to complete a job application, read a newspaper, read directions on medications, or help their children with schoolwork.[2]
- Having at least one English-speaking adult in the home increases the likelihood of a parent or guardian attending a school or class event, parent-teacher conference, or meeting with a guidance counselor.[3],[4]
- Compared to communities across the nation, Indian River County has the 10th largest income gap between the top 1% and bottom 99% of earners out of over 3000 counties nationwide. Annually, the top 1% earn an average of \$2.9 million, and the bottom 99% earn an average of \$43,373. Yet, it costs \$63,145 for a family of four to afford to live in our community. [5] Literacy Services of IRC connects with individuals from all walks of life, income brackets, and backgrounds in this diverse community.
- Education and communication levels are directly correlated to a person's earning potential. [6] On average, a person with less than a high school diploma will earn \$19,000 less annually than a person with a diploma, equating to over \$700,000 during their lifetime working.[7]
